Wound Management Guidelines

Nurses can begin managing wounds before a wound care provider is available by keeping in mind the components of a wound assessment, identification of the wound etiology, and the principles of appropriate topical management described here. Wound care performed by the nurse should be guided by the nurse's scope of practice and institutional policy and procedures, based on type of wound and topical agents available in the facility.
